The board chairman noted damage to the building in light of the increased rent. The purpose of this meeting is to discuss the future of this building and the future of LCCS as a tenant. There are three issues for this building: plans for 705 Adams and the CLC; rent; and parking costs in the future. There had been nothing in writing up until a couple of hours prior to this board meeting, which was an email that will be shared with the board members.

Unity Church in West Toledo donated an assortment of infant items, including pull-ups, diaper wipes, and baby clothes. The congregation each year collects needed items to help babies served by LCCS.

Rolled Alloys in Temperance, MI, donated more than 50 blankets made by employees during lunch-hour events. Company staff already have reached out to see what other needs they can help fill in the near future.

Bags of Love 419 provided 20 infant care bags as their monthly LCCS commitment, which is now nearing the 18-month mark. That equates to 360 care bags for infants/toddlers containing items many families cannot afford on their own.

Since the LCCS diaper bank joined with the Salvation Army diaper bank in February 2021, the nonprofit has provided more than 350 cases of diapers and wipes that caseworkers and community advocates have delivered to homes.

Hope United Methodist Church donated 100 blankets made by its congregation as part of a regular comfort ministry.

Sunshine Yarn Project dropped off 50 handmade stuffed animals to give kids served by LCCS as Easter gifts.
