August Course Descriptions

VIRTUAL Impact of Substance Use Resource Family Date: August 4, 2023

Johnson, Ronna

CONTENT: This course helps participants understand the short and long-term impact on children exposed to substances prenatally including FASD. Also covered are issues that may be present if parents use(d) substances and medical issues that can arise due to substance exposure including a higher risk of later addiction. The genetic component of addiction and addiction as a chronic disease is described. This course also shares parenting strategies for children exposed to substances prenatally.

RR: Parenting a Child with a History of Sexual Trauma DATE: August 4, 2023 Johnson, Ronna

CONTENT: Resource Readiness - CARING FOR CHILDREN WHO HAVE BEEN SEXUALLY ABUSED

This course identifies the indicators of sexual abuse and the impact of interrupted sexual development, highlighting the unique challenges associated with parenting children who have been sexually abused. The potential risk factors for children who have experienced sexual trauma including re-victimization, sexual trafficking, and re-enactment behaviors are covered. Effective parenting strategies that can help keep children safe and help them heal from sexual trauma are highlighted.

CONTENT: Resource Readiness – FAMILY SAFETY

This course helps participants become aware of strategies to make children impacted by trauma and loss feel psychologically and physically safe and covers how to set up a home to be safe for all household members. This course also covers how the sense of safety ties to behaviors, how to set boundaries, and how to show consistency and predictability using routines and rituals. How to be attuned to children and understand safety from a child's perspective is also highlighted.

RR: Mental Health Considerations DATE: August 5, 2023

Johnson, Ronna CONTENT: Resource Readiness - MENTAL HEALTH, SELF-REGULATION, AND SELF-CARE

This course provides a basic understanding of mental health disorders and conditions that commonly occur in childhood. Content is shared to illustrate that not all 'survival' behaviors or symptoms of grief are connected with mental health disorders. Commonly administered psychotropic medications are described and information about how to obtain consistent, adequate and appropriate access to mental health services is highlighted.

Substance Exposed Infants and Toddlers: Interventions to Promote Long-Term Success IN-PERSON @ Main Library McMaster DATE: August 8, 2023

TIME: 9:00 am - 12:00 pm CONTENT: "The Lucas County Juvenile Court, Lucas County Children Services and Talbot Health Services is hosting a training to help educate caregivers and service providers on interventions that can be utilized to help provide support for substance exposed infants and toddlers. This training is FREE and is being offered to you because you are a person who is or will be taking care of a child exposed to substances or helping to provide support to the child caregivers."

Dr. Stephanie Weber and Elsie Bush work at Cincinnati Children's Hospital Medical Center and have been working with and studying this population for many years. They are members of an interdisciplinary team that evaluates preschool-aged children with prenatal opioid exposure in the Next Step Clinic. They also were co-developers of the curriculum for Project SCOPE: Supporting Children of the Opioid Epidemic, which is a multi-state training opportunity. Dr. Weber specializes in treatment for children with neurodevelopmental delays and disabilities and Ms. Bush specializes in visual impairments and sensory and motor differences in children.

Reaching Higher: A Curriculum for Foster/Adoptive Parents and Kinship Caregivers Caring for LGBTQ You (6.0 Credit Hours) **IN-PERSON**

DATE: August 14, 2023

CONTENT: This training was developed to increase the competence of any family providing out-of-home care for LBGTQ youth: foster families, kinship care families, guardianship families, or adoptive families. The curriculum is meant to enhance the skills of those providing direct care for LGBTQ youth.

Identity Theft Prevention: The Basics and Strategies to Help Vulnerable Individuals **IN-PERSON**

DATE: August 17, 2023 Rosebrough-Zody, Christina TIME: 1:00 pm – 4:00 pm CONTENT: Identity thieves commit a crime that can long go unnoticed after victimization. Identity theft is among the fastest growing problems facing Americans today. Unfortunately, it is one of the hottest crimes for to be committed against some of America's most vulnerable populations - the elderly and disabled. Over ten million Americans have reported having their identities stolen in the last year. Unfortunately, many individuals do not know how to properly report the crime; thus, the statistics are low compared to the number of individuals that are affected. In this session, you will learn easy steps to take to reduce vulnerabilities to the crime for adult populations. Participants will learn "terms of art" both online and off. Participants will leave the session with simple rules to follow; handy checklists to use; and even easy-to-use form letters that can be utilized for their clientele. Strategies will be discussed to help in the prevention of identity theft for vulnerable adults as well as the correct avenues of reporting so that a potential victim can be helped in the legal and financial systems.

RR: An Overview of Legal Issues for Foster Caregiver **IN-PERSON**

DATE: August 17, 2023

Rosebrough-Zody, Christina CONTENT: Resource Readiness - LEGAL AND ETHICAL ISSUES FOR CAREGIVERS

Foster parents will learn to identify and learn different court procedures in order to help them with their basic responsibilities and obligations for the children in their care. This workshop will help foster parents identify the roles and responsibilities of the legal team; become familiar with the phases of a court hearing; and identify the procedure of public access of information. Participants will have a working knowledge of their rights and responsibilities in the courtroom; filing of pleadings; and court procedures pursuant to federal law and Ohio law. Participants will also be able to recognize areas of potential liability in regards to their actions as well as those of the children in their care.

Can I Use the Cell Phone? Electronic Media Forensic Evidence **IN-PERSON**

DATE: August 18, 2023 Rosebrough-Zody, Christina TIME: 9:00 am – 4:00 pm CONTENT: In this workshop, participants will get a working knowledge of the legal processes regarding basic electronic mediums and how evidence from these devices can and cannot be used in court. Participants will be taught how to preserve this evidence, as necessary, so that forensic analysis can be done on the electronic medium to help law enforcement personnel with any potential criminal case as well as the adult protective service case. Electronic media that will be focused upon will be cell phones, digital photographs, and electronic medical records.

Invisible Injuries: The Impacts of Trauma **IN-PERSON** Walters, Paula

DATE: August 19, 2023

CONTENT: Trauma is not segregated pockets of events or occurrences that happen in silos. Rather, trauma is intersections of different adverse life events that layer upon each other, forcing these events to be intertwined. When this occurs, a person is not able to differentiate between healthy and harmful environments. The intention of this workshop is to dismantle these silos, as treatment cannot only tackle one component of trauma independently from the others. Attendees will address myths that surround abuse, and be challenged to confront their own bias regarding the abusers, the victims, and the incidents of abuse. This workshop takes you to the uncomfortable steps of "walking a mile in the shoes of trauma survivors".

CONTENT: Resource Readiness - TRAUMA AND ITS IMPACT ON CHILDREN AND THE FAMILY, PROMOTING ATTACHMENT This course helps participants understand the importance of attachment in parenting, both for the children and parents who are fostering or adopting. It covers the impact of fractured attachments/lack of attachments on children's ability to attach and identifies strategies to develop healthy attachment bonds. This course also covers developing trust and developing children's sense of connectedness and belonging. How to be attuned to children and recognizing and honoring children's primary attachment to their families is also highlighted.

RR: Trauma Related Behaviors DATE: August 19, 2023

CONTENT: Resource Readiness - TRAUMA AND ITS IMPACT ON CHILDREN AND THE FAMILY, PROMOTING ATTACHMENT This course helps participants learn how chaos, threat, neglect, and other adversity during development can alter the developing brain and that, in turn, can change the ways children think, feel and act. Participants will understand the major stress-responses we use to cope with perceived and actual threat and the reasons for and range of adaptive symptoms from inattention and distractibility to avoidance and shutdown. Also covered are the reasons for rejection and testing and recognition of the survival skills and coping strategies that result in a complex range of behaviors.

RR: Creating a Stable, Nurturing, and Safe Home Environment DATE: August 19, 2023 Musser. Nadine CONTENT: Resource Readiness – FAMILY SAFETY

Examining Unconventional and Mischar	acterized Trauma Expressions in Black Males	(6 Credit Hours)

DATE: September 8, 2023	Logan, LaToya	TIME: 9:00 am -4:00 pm

CONTENT: Raising awareness related to diagnosis, evaluation, and treatment referrals based on a lack of cultural inclusion surrounding Black males who exhibit aggression and apathy is the necessary first step to addressing disparities. Viewing apathy as a defense mechanism encourages social workers to strengthen their assessments and challenge outcomes. It allows for a deeper understanding of how trauma experiences can manifest into aggression and apathy based on cultural norms and environmental factors that have not been evaluated. Through cultural competence and inclusion of cultural differences, social workers can lead changes in the fields of mental health and social services. They can help promote equity in educational programming and support, make court referrals for treatment options instead of confinement, and develop more effective assessments and treatment interventions that have a direct impact on individuals, families, and communities.

DATE: September 21, 2023 Prezioso, Deanna CONTENT: Resource Readiness - LEGAL AND ETHICAL ISSUES FOR CAREGIVERS

This workshop will give participants an understanding of common ethical dilemmas encountered by resource caregivers both in working with agency staff as well as in their work with birth family. Participants will also gain an understanding of resources available to assist them with navigating ethical considerations.

Mentoring Among Foster Caregivers - Strengthening the Team **IN-PERSON**

DATE: September 22, 2023 Prezioso, Deanna TIME: 9:00 am - 4:00 pm CONTENT: This class will give participants an understanding of the adult principals of learning and how they apply to mentoring. We will examine the role and purpose of a mentor for foster and adoptive caregivers, and common characteristics of effective mentors and mentees. Caregivers and staff will understand the similarities and differences between informal and formal mentoring and how the mentoring process can be used to build stronger foster families with better outcomes for the placements in their homes. Participants will also gain an understanding of how to develop an effective mentoring program.

Understanding and Surviving Grief and Loss while Fostering: The Emotional Roller Coaster (3.0 Credit Hours) **IN-PERSON**

DATE: September 23, 2023 Prezioso, Deanna CONTENT: This class will give participants an understanding of the reactions to grief and loss and explain ambiguous loss theory.

Participants will gain an understanding of the similarities and differences between the emotions they experience, the emotions children in care experience, and the emotions experienced during a final loss such as death. Participants will examine how the emotions experienced during grief and loss are related to their role of foster caregiver and how they can effectively care for themselves and manage their emotions.

Preventing Placement Disruptions Before Placement Begins **IN-PERSON**

DATE: September 23, 2023 Prezioso, Deanna CONTENT: This workshop will give participants an understanding of the most common reasons for placement disruption and the stages of disruption. Participants will also gain an understanding of the factors that most commonly lead to placement stability and lower levels of disruptions. Participants will examine the current practices used both before and during placements being in their home and will also examine how these practices can lead to disruption and/or preservation of placement. Finally, participants will discuss and gain an understanding of steps they can implement that will help minimize placement disruptions before the placement even enters the home.

RR: Verbal De-escalation in Child Welfare IN-PERSON

DATE: September 29, 2023 Lowery, Brian CONTENT: Resource Readiness - FAMILY SAFETY

This class will examine how pre-placement experiences and current stressors may affect a foster child's emotions, leading to escalating behaviors. This workshop reviews the skills of active listening, non-violent communication, and de-escalation, Levels of crisis development and the conflict cycle are discussed, emphasizing appropriate foster parent response. Trainees will participate in exercises and demonstrations concerning personal space, body posture and motion, which will enable them to more successfully deal with emotional or physical crisis which can occur with children living in out of home care.

Navigating the Whitewater of Reunification: Primary Family, Agency, and Foster Parent Collaboration (3.0 Credit Hours) **IN-PERSON**

DATE: September 29, 2023 Lowery, Brian CONTENT: This class will examine the complex dynamics facing birth families before, during, and after placement. While emphasizing the advantages of safe reunification of children with birth families, this training will help foster parents come to further appreciate the "biological

bond," as well as challenge them to consider forgiveness as a foundation of collaborative work with parents. This workshop will also develop a framework for shared parenting, including promoting and building the "parent/foster parent team," and provide practical guidelines for such issues as visitation, phone calls, and establishing boundaries.

Adolescent Development IN-PERSON

Ongoing Caregiver Training

Resource families (formerly named foster caregivers) are required by the State of Ohio to complete 30 hours of training every two years to maintain their foster care license. Treatment resource families are required to complete 45 hours. The curriculum is developed in accordance with the caregiver's Individual Training Needs Assessment (ITNA) and Individual Development Plan (IDP).

Resource Readiness (RR)

As of January 2023, New Foster Resource Families must complete training on 11 topics for their first recertification period. Based on your ITNA, its recommended that you take one course from each topic. These courses are one to two and half hours in length. They do not have to be completed in order. These training will be labeled with an RR before the title in the quarterly calendar. In CAPS they will be labeled as below.
